





Love, Faith and **Options** for Unplanned Pregnancies

An unplanned pregnancy can create a lot of questions and concerns for everyone involved, but mostly they hang heavily on the young mother-to-be. I'm not ready. I can't afford to raise a child. Who will help me take care of the baby? What about school? What if I get kicked out of my home?

At this critical moment in her life, emotions flood her mind and hormones change her body, leaving her unable to see the options available to her. The women that find their way to Hannah's Hope in Casselberry find the answers they need wrapped in loving acceptance for both the unborn child and the mother.

As she enters the warm and tastefully appointed center, a young woman may not know she's pregnant. However, if she is, her baby's heart, the size of a poppy seed, is already beating for eighteen days. He has his own unique DNA which determines hair and eye color, gender, facial features and everything that will make him a unique and valuable individual.

The discussion of abortion is not avoided. The consequences of this decision can be so life altering that the center counsels women who once thought it was the right or easy one at the time.

These are only a few of the services of this new Christ-centered pregnancy care center. Since it opened its doors in January, women have received encouragement, support, educational classes, and most importantly the hope found in the gospel. At least seven women who have come into Hannah's Hope this year, who were abortion minded, have changed their minds and decided to give their babies life. After reading the scriptures in Psalm 71 and Psalm 139 and receiving encouragement and help with resources to meet their needs, these women now are finding joy in motherhood. (Continued page 13)

"Special People" in Our Community

One of the most avid volunteers in Central Florida has been Casselberry's Tony Tizzio. Tizzio hosted and produced a Community Service television show called Special People, the first regular media attention given to disability issues in Central Florida. He has helped the disabled with their concerns about housing, transit, and health services. "We, the disabled, can do anything we wish, given our limitations. We can be doctors, lawyers, ministers, and even would-be writers like myself," Tizzio says a good-hearted poke at himself.



Now he's Rev. Tony Tizzio. A couple of years ago, he and a group of friends

started GEMM God's Eternal Miracles Ministries. GEMM is a Christian ministry to help the less fortunate, which he plans to develop into a church for all.

Rev. Tizzio's goals are a show of his faith in action. Long term they include a computerized information database for people with disabilities, support group meetings, day care facilities, special therapies, and Christian educational curriculum for the physically and mentally disabled. Along the way, however, Rev. Tizzio says, "I hope this column will entertain, educate & maybe even amuse you."

Hannah's Hope was created by Bob and Gwyn Picerne because they believe everyone should have access to this information. All of the center's services are provided free of charge.

However, this is the second way the Picernes feel that God has moved them to serve families through founding an organization. Their other one, Embraced by Grace, is a Christian based adoption center. Its philosophy is to "place children with parents that pledge to bring those children up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. We will seek to ensure that all children referred to our Agency be placed with a Christian family that is appropriate for them taking into consideration the child's interests and needs."

Once in a healthy, accepting atmosphere, women can think about their options clearly. With time to consider the resources available to them, these women decide to continue in their pregnancy. Over 90 percent of the time, after seeing their unborn child during an ultrasound, women choose life for their babies.



Schools



"I'm going to holler and keep on hollering—and let me say I'm not seeking public office in the spring, but we all must realize... we are in the middle of the biggest development in the country and we can't just sit by!"

What had former State Senator Douglas Stenstrom so fired up in January 1962? The same thing that had Seminole County School Superintendant R. T. Milwee (namesake of **Milwee Middle School**) stressed over the delayed transfer of 1,000 from Lyman High School (the current Milwee) to a new Junior High School. Stenstrom saw the county's need for new ways to handle everything from roadway beautification to traffic safety—but especially schools. Why? The answer laid only miles away at Cape Canaveral—the NOVA Project, to put a man on the moon by the end of the decade. The Casselberry area was key for new development. The town had been the fastest growing small town in the fastest growing metropolitan area in the country by 1960. And Stenstrom expected Seminole County to double again in the next decade. Casselberry, in fact, did.

Casselberry Elementary opened in 1960. On May 5, 1961, Hibbard Casselberry, the city's founder and concerned parent, took education into his own hands. With the approval of Principal Heckenback, he had a large piece of furniture brought into the 6th Grade classroom. It was a television so that the students could watch astronaut Alan Shepherd be the first man launched into space—for a 15 minute and 28 second flight aboard *Freedom 7*.



On September 4, 1962, Superintendant Milwee was relieved that the new **South Seminole Middle School** had opened, "the first new middle school built in Seminole in many, many years." John Angel was the principal of the school, and Mr. Christy Harp had taken over the elementary school. The Orlando Sentinel grinned and wrote, "When Mr. Harp and Mr. Angel look around they see students from a family called Heaven."

However, not everything was heavenly when it came to the roads. County school busses drove up and down Winter Park Drive and Seminola daily. Because the roads were clay based and inside the town, the responsibility for the maintenance became the biggest item in the town's budget. Slippery and slimy in the rainy season and filled with ruts when it was dry, the town and county could not reach an agreement about how to handle them until the parents who had to drive those roads voiced their dissent.

Before **English Estates** could open its doors to 410 students in March 1964, it had been in double sessions with Casselberry Elementary's 624 students. Whew!

Lyman High School's graduating Class of 1965 was the last one when it was possible to go from Grade 1 through 12 at the same school. Danny Casselberry, Hibbard's oldest grandson, was one of the ones who attended Lyman for 12 years. Anyone else want to share your story? Email <u>info@allcass.com</u>

Eagle Scouts Honored As Troop 341 Celebrates 62 Year Anniversary



Boy Scout Troop 341 of Casselberry's Community United Methodist Church has the distinction of being the longest continuously chartered troop in the Central Florida Council. It was formed on October 31, 1948. Sixty boys from the troop have earned Scouting's highest honor, the Eagle Award, over the past 62 years.





The latest, Mason Krug, 15, (left, with his parents) and Matthew Breen, 15, (right, with his parents) received their Eagle Scout awards at an Eagle Court ceremony on Sept. 27. As part of the stringent requirements for becoming an Eagle, the boys each had to plan and complete a community project. Matthew, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Breen of Longwood, collected donations at his school for an animal shelter. Mason, son of Scoutmaster and Mrs. Steve Krug of Casselberry, chose an environmental project that involved marking storm drains for the city of Ocoee.

Scoutmaster Krug, himself an Eagle, said with justifiable pride, "This year alone, Scouting's 100th anniversary, the troop has had six Scouts earn their Eagle with at least two more ready to complete their requirements by the end of the year. Marshall Starks of Winter Springs was the first to earn his Eagle this year adding to a legacy started by his father and uncle, who were members of the troop."

Others attaining the Eagle rank this year include Drew Baker, Longwood; Jordan Horvath, Maitland and Aaron Eyler, Casselberry.

The troop's active schedule includes weekly meetings and monthly camping where the scouts learn and enhance outdoor skills. They can earn merit badges to advance in rank and participate in high adventure activities during a week of summer camp, which this year was at Camp Thunder in Molina, Ga.

"Troop 341 continues to be a positive force in teaching Scouting values to our youth". said Krug. "Boys interested in taking part in the Scouting Adventure (as a Cub Scout for ages 6-10) or Boy Scout (ages 11-18) are invited to stop by Community United Methodist Church on Monday nights from 7:30 to 9 p.m."

Growing Up in Casselberry

Troop 341 has Rich History

"Growing up in Casselberry was the best of times... not so much in the urban things, but we had things to explore," recalls Bill Dempsey, a former member of Troop 341. Coming out from Orange County, this was a new world.

In the clay pit, which now looks like a pond on the City Center property, draglines pulled clay out to use on town roads. Boys imaginations and skills grew playing in the tree fort, long since torn down. Loading the school bus while drivers raced down Hwy. 17-92 was dangerous. The Police Officer, "Pop" Kennedy chased violators, which only amused the children. But Scouts today would think that living in Casselberry then was as much fun as being at camp all year around.

Among the original troop members was Bobby Hattaway, who would later become a state legislator and successful business man. In the late 1940s, Walter Miller remembered being Len's young assistant in the troop. But sometimes the boy's desire for adventure got them in trouble. "We had our regular meeting and when it was over a few of us decided we would sneak into the Drive-In Theater on 436. We made it, but did get chewed out."

Joe Mattocks, one of the early scouts, enjoyed it—given the options he had at the time. "It was far less structured than Vacation Bible School. And Leonard, our Scoutmaster was fun, and he had a great selection of comic books.

When Leonard Casselberry, the Troop's first Scoutmaster, heard that comment, he just laughed and nodded. He had been a Boy Scout during his younger days in Winter Park and had earlier formed a boy's club to give local youths something to do. Scouting, he felt, would offer purpose and structure to the group.

Boy Scout Troop 341 of Casselberry was officially chartered on Oct. 31, 1948 under the sponsorship of Community Methodist Church. "I never dreamed when we started that 62 years later, the troop would still be going strong," said Casselberry. "I'm proud of the boys and hope they have fond memories of their Scouting days."

Later joining Casselberry in leading the troop were experienced Scouters Wally Krohne (Scoutmaster, 1953-56) and Ted Daniel (advisor, 1957; Scoutmaster 1958-1988).

Together Ted and Leonard, who both had sons in the troop, took the Scouts on many summer camping trips to places like Key West, New Orleans and the mountains of North Carolina and Tennessee in the 50s and 60s. Over 3 decades, 50,000 miles were logged in trips and campouts in troop owned converted school buses.


The troop captured many awards at various Scouting events, including a Camporee held in Casselberry in the then undeveloped woods near Camelot and Deer Run. Dew Drop Pond had been previously named Lake Molly, after Len's sister.

The troop laid out a 20-mile hiking trail through fields, woods and farm land from Casselberry to Oviedo and dubbed it "The Chowhound Trail". A special patch was designed for those who completed the hike. The Scouts hiked, swam and canoed their way to earn awards and badges, including the 100 mile patch.

Ted Daniel was an excellent scoutmaster and was recognized for it with awards and opportunities for the troop, says Rick Casselberry, a former Eagle Scout. "One time we set up a camp demonstration in front of a business on State Road 50 to earn a donation for troop equipment. Another time, we were selected to camp in Winter Park's Central Park to bolster security for the famous annual Art Festival."


"Mr. Daniel always wanted us to be special. He was so proud of us sometimes it was almost embarrassing," remembers Rick. "When there was going to be an observation tower contest at the next camping event we cut tall cypress trees to use for the wood and practiced our rope knot tying. But that wasn't enough for Ted. He had us actually make the rope from twine."

By the time Daniel retired after 30 years as troop leader, 500 boys had passed through the roster. Many of his former scouts showed up to honor Daniels at his retirement party, where he was presented the Scoutmaster Award of Merit, the National Eagle Scout Association Award, the United Methodist Church's Cross and Flame Award, the Scoutmaster Emeritus Palm and a \$1000 gift.




Above: Ted Daniel Tribute and "A Salute to a Scoutmaster written to him.



Music is for All Ages

Children love music and enjoy the creative aspect of playing an instrument. It probably never enters their mind that it also promotes self-esteem, self-direction, and improving social skills such as working in teams.

Seminole County has some of the best music educators in the country running the Band and Choral programs in our Middle Schools and High Schools, according to Barry James at Music Teachers Collective. He should know. He has played with some big time artists, and extremely popular local bands, and has many recordings under his belt. His students have gone on to many major music schools, recorded hit songs, and played with successful bands on their own.

However, when the drive is on to focus on the fiscal budget, James says music teachers feel they don't get the respect and financial support they truly deserve. Many times music classes are decreased or eliminated. Astute parents realize this could be short-sited and are increasingly opting to provide their children with private music lessons. Why?



A recent joint study from Boston College and the Harvard Graduate School of Education found that there are "direct causal links between music education and achievement in non-arts academics." The survey looked at almost 12,000 studies from all over the world and came to the conclusion that students who study music perform better in standardized tests (reading, math, science, SATs, et cetera) and have improved special abilities. They are more likely to stay in school and go on to college than students who do not study music or other arts disciplines.

The fun and benefits are not restricted to children. Adults from 18 to 80 have enrolled in music classes all over the country in increasing numbers in the last few years. "The Seniors Band Program I organized at the Villages Retirement Community has grown

from one class a week to four," James says. "Now they have a waiting list of men and women wanting to develop that creative urge."

If you are considering taking music lessons, or improving your performance, here are some things to look for. The school should have an environment dedicated specifically to music education, plus rehearsal and performance space. Ask about their equipment. Is it state-of-the-art? Most of all, find a professional music teacher who will care enough to educate and motivate you to bring out the music inside .

WEBSITE 101 Do You Need One?

Over half of Casselberry's businesses are home-based. Many of you reading this may have one. That's why this column is for you.

We know that in business, growing pains can be expensive. Once your business is legally formed, and you're ready to take on clients, advertising is probably the first thing you think of. If you've got an established business, you know that people move, change their minds, and shop price these days. So you need a fresh supply of new customers ready to fill in the slots. One way to do that is to have a good website.

You look at the options:

You could have your neighbor or your nephew who seems very good with computers build one. However, as one of my business partners said, "If you think hiring a professional to design your web site is expensive – wait until you hire an amateur."

Web developers are expensive in most cases. You could find yourself spending upwards of \$3,000 if you're not careful. Some are cheap, but check twice on their quality and references.

Easy, Do It Yourself (DIY) template sites, like "Quicken Intuit" or Go Daddy's "Web Site Tonight" might look attractive. You get to use your own graphics and logos, and place as much or as little text on your page as you want. Some are FREE!

What's the problem? It's easy because it's a template. It looks like one. Few things are truly customizable. Some sites require a beginner knowledge of HTML code to take advantage of the "web page builder" features.

You balance your skill and budget, and then think, "Not bad, inexpensive, and I can do it myself." Once your website goes live, you wait for your customers to rush in. After a couple weeks you begin to think "Why don't' they respond? The phone isn't ringing."

Don't feel bad. You've created a template - an electronic brochure. People must be looking for precisely what you have. The only way you'll get visitors is by telling your customers to go there by writing the URL on your business card, sign, or direct mail campaigns. But will they go there – repeatedly? What about the customers you don't have? How are you going to reach out to them?

That's where SEO (Search Engine Optimization) comes in. Your site has to be written in such a way that the search engines can not only find your web site but also list your site among other results when certain words or phrases are used, not to mention near the TOP of the list.


You can have a pretty website but that's not what a search engine is looking for. It wants pertinent content and properly formatted elements in your code which will result in more people finding your website. How you get there is what we'll cover next month.



Neighborhood Spotlight: Vern Chaney Subdivision

If you ask people here who Vern Chaney is or why two streets near Casselberry Elementary are named for him almost no one knows. But the two are intertwined.

The elementary school opened in 1960. Children from six to twelve years old faced their new world, with excitement and curiosity mixed in with a tinge of fear. What were they to expect of this new world? At the same time Dr. Vern Chaney faced a defining moment in his life. He had volunteered for three months to help his friend, Dr. Tom Dooley in Vietnam and Cambodia to establish surgical procedures, train local health workers, and assist in the care of children and villagers displaced by the war.

Dooley had become nearly legendary in his humanitarian medical programs starting with MEDICO which he began in 1958. In a few short years Dooley had established seventeen medical programs in fourteen countries to aid the sick and teach people in third world countries to care for themselves and each other. On a normal day, you could find Dooley and two others treating over 100 people. When the hospital was established and staff trained they turned them over to the local people and government.

Chaney flew into Viet-Nam to serve with Dooley temporarily, and Dooley said almost prophetically, "He certainly is a fine surgeon and I certainly hope that MEDICO is able to utilize his help and services later."

Only five months later, Dooley died of cancer at the age of 34. His brother Malcolm asked Dr. Chaney to give up his practice and take over MEDICO. Chaney did. MEDICO folded for lack of funds. However, Chaney established the Dooley Foundation that same month thus tying Dooley's name to his international work to provide health care for the less fortunate around the world. In 1976, Dr. Chaney established International as the affiliated international extension of the work of Dooley-Intermed Inc.


About this time Martha Casselberry, widow of the city's founder, Hibbard Casselberry, read of Chaney's work with the Dooley-Intermed and contacted him. The two became friends, and on rare times when Chaney came to the states, he would visit her in Casselberry. "Casselberry was such a magical place, and Martha was so gracious. I loved the time I spent there, and with John," Chaney said recently. And speaking of Martha's housekeeper, he said, "I remember her well. Do tell her I remember her. Eventually, he invited Martha to sit on the Board of Directors of Intermed.

When asked how streets were named after him, Chaney said, "That was typically Martha. She wanted to put up a statue of me, in her zest to bring recognition to Intermed." Chaney declined the statue, but when Martha sold the land near the schools, she exercised her prerogative and named the streets for him. Today, the name Dr. Vern Chaney is known in remote areas of Nepal, Honduras, Laos, Thailand, and Africa... and now in Casselberry.

Chaney and Martha had a friendly and somewhat jousting relationship. In one letter he wrote her, "Dear Martha, Don't be shocked! This is not an appeal for money—or even goats—but of course neither are ever refused."


However, when she asked for a certain piece of jewelry (his Rat ring) to seal their friendship, the kind and gentle doctor wrote back, "What do you want next, Casselberry, Blood?!! This was my "Rat" ring. We wore it till we received our class ring in third year. You don't get it! Only over my dead body!"

Martha passed way in 1990. Presumably, Chaney, now 87, still has his Rat ring.



Where in the world is Carlos?



So Near, Yet So Far Away by Carlos Giraldo

Business this year has been challenging and I've turned to counting the pennies buried deep in my pocket. That means I'm in a predicament. Time and money are low, but the desire to retreat is high. If you find yourself wondering, "Where can I escape and give myself a relaxing break," do what my wife and I do.

Just a gas tank (roundtrip) away, New Smyrna Beach has it all - sun, sand, water, restaurants, shopping, outdoor activities, but is far enough from away (60 miles) you can say, "We went away."

Prices are economical during summer and fall. Last year, I paid as little as \$125 for a one bedroom unit on a high rise overlooking the ocean replete with balcony and full kitchen (I recommend the Ocean Trillium or Coastal Waters). This year, the recession has hit the beach, too, so it's even more competitive.

If you get to go to New Smyrna Beach, here's what you might want to do on a typical 2 day getaway over the weekend:

Saturday – Go to the beach in the early morning hours. After you pass the second bridge over the Indian River estuary there are several ramps along A1A which bring you right onto the water. There, you can bake under the sun on the sand right next to your parked car . The water is clear, and the waves rushing in can give you a good whooping if you are not looking. I like how the rhythmic sound of the waves literally drown out thoughts about work and everything else that we left behind.

When you get hungry, dial Mon Delice. This French bakery makes the most delicious sandwich heroes in town. Their ratings are through the roof. My mouth just waters as I write this. The bakery is perfectly located 5 minutes (car) or a 15 minute walk from the beach. By 3 p.m. we typically suspend replenishing our Vitamin D deficiency and head back to the condo for a quick nap.

In the evening, head to The Garlic, a wonderful Italian restaurant, with live entertainment on the weekends. When you return to the beach, take an easy barefoot walk as the sun sinks into the night. Not far offshore we have seen many times dolphins lazily eating their evening meal and the sky silhouetted with flocks of pelicans. Truly enchanting.

Wait, the day is not over yet. Run back into town and catch the latest film at the New Smyrna Beacon Theater. You'll be back at your condo just before midnight.

Sunday – Sitting high up above the water with your hands wrapped around a cup of coffee and watching the morning sun blaze across the eastern sky trumps any place on earth I've been. Try it and tell me I'm wrong. For breakfast, our favorite is the Beacon Restaurant on Flagler Avenue for a delicious American-styled breakfast replete with bacon, eggs, hash brown potatoes and pancakes.

Then hurry down A1A to J B's Fish Camp and rent a kayak. Paddle along the river's estuary watching the pelicans, herons, egrets, manatee and dolphins. Any sense of time and pressure you have left will melt away.

I think of homemade Beef Vegetable Soup, candied apples, and tailgate parties.

The tailgate parties I remember the most are those where several of us all cooked something and we had a great covered dish lunch before and many times again after the game. We would have everything from baked ham and fried chicken to homemade brownies and chocolate chip cookies. The more the merrier and the more variety of food we would have. No matter what time of season – or what game is on – why not create some specialty hot dogs? Buy different types of sausages, a variety of breads, and get a variety of toppings. Nothing beats sautéed onions with English mustard on a fresh baguette. The first time I had a hot dog like that was in a little English pub in a town called Paineswick.

You can use any kind of wiener you like. I use regular franks, Italian sausage, kielbasa, brats, or whatever sausage I like. You can do the same. Some people have problems with the wine rating system at Wine Spectator Magazine, but we need to remember that one person's favorite wine is someone else's ordinary wine. Most of us prefer to do our own tasting, but the folks at the Wine Spectator, and other wine publications, get to taste a whole bunch more wine than we do. Use the ratings as a guide. If you're choosing between 2 wines you have not tried, go with the higher rating. You may occasionally be disappointed. I have been, but that's life. Like a guy once told me, "If you're looking for a guarantee, go buy a washing machine. They all have 'em."

The reason I bring up the Wine Spectator is that they just came out with an issue that was about wine values. It included three pages with wine values from three different areas. Each page had 25 wines with a price and a rating. Wine publications have a different idea of value than most of the rest of us. Anything under \$35 seems to be a value. I know lots of people who think a value wine is anything under \$10. And there is good wine at that price. However, when you look at all the wine out there in the world, \$35 is toward to bottom of the price chart.

So, let's look at the results and see where in the world the values are coming from. I can't reproduce all 75 wines here, but you will be able to see the region, the ratings range, the price range, the median price of each region's 25 wines, and the average price of each region's 25 wines.

Bordeaux (France). Vintage – all 2007. Price range – \$11 to \$34; Average – \$26; Median – \$28; Ratings range – 85 to 89. Bordeaux is one of the most famous and most expensive wine regions in the world. Wines at this quality level and these prices are a bargain if you like Bordeaux. All the wines are red on this list.

California Central Coast. Vintages – 2007 & 2008. Price range – \$10 to \$25; Average – \$17.50; Median – \$16; Ratings range – 85 to 92. California's Central Coast runs from Monterey County (South of San Francisco) to Santa Barbara (north of L.A.). Wines on this list are about 60% red and 40% white.

Spain. Vintages – 2005 thru 2009. Price range – \$7 to \$15; Average – \$11.70; Median – \$12; Ratings range – 85 to 90. The Spanish wines come from pretty much anywhere in Spain, and they have more vineyard acreage than anybody else in the world. So they know something about wine. The list is about 80% red. Compare the prices and the ratings, and you'll see where the values are.

Set realistic expectations

Besides, making a promise you know you can't keep is one of the quickest ways to lose trust. Build peoples' confidence by setting achievable goals and meet those expectations.



Persistence

An idea seldom works the first time. If it does, there is usually plenty of room for improvement. Big goals are an endurance race, not a sprint. To persevere we must not listen to all the voices that say it can't be done or you'll never make it. Patience




